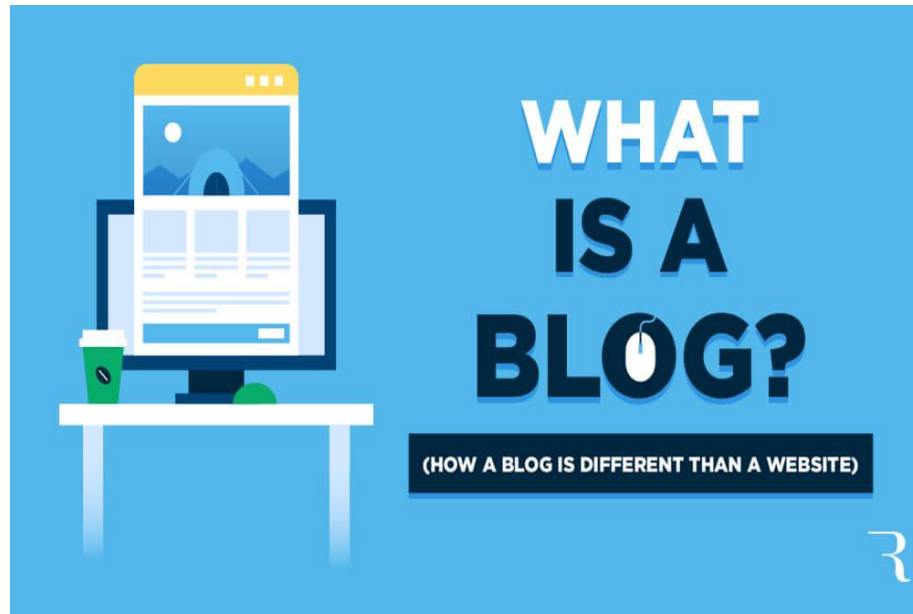

What is Edublogs..

Edublogs is a blogging platform on the web and as an app designed for educators and students. By itself, it's not a teaching or learning tool. Instead, Edublogs makes it possible for teachers to create classroom and student blogs that include text, video, images, and other media.



Edublogs can be used as instructional resources, in which teachers can post tips, explanations or samples to help students learn. The use of blogs in the classroom allows both the teacher and student the ability to edit and add content at any time

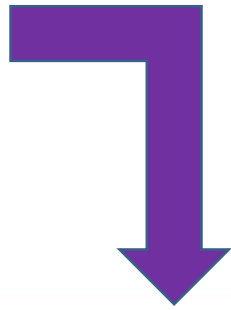

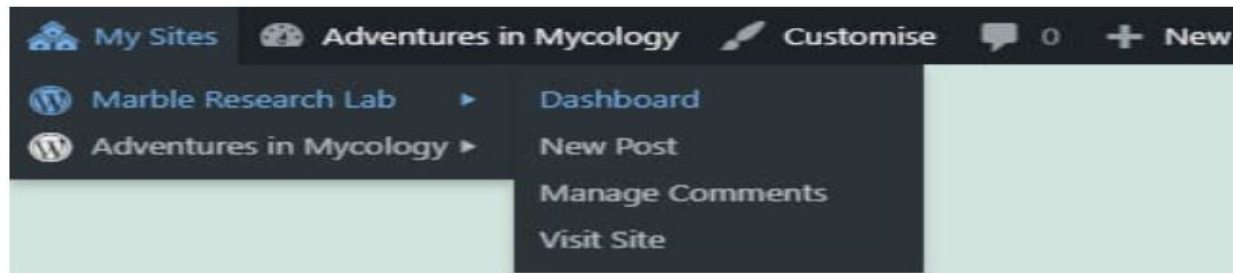

Add New Site or Blog To Existing Account

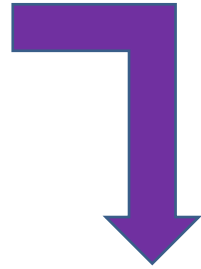
You can add more than one site or blog to your Edublogs account which allows you to use a single account login to manage all your sites and blogs.

Once you have created more than one site you'll see your sites listed under your My Sites dropdown menu in your admin bar.



Log in to your Edublogs account (if you are not already logged in) and go to **Dashboard > My Sites** and click on **Add New**. This takes you to the [sign up form](#) where you'll see your current sites listed with an option to set up new site.


This is the area in your administration panel where you see a listing of all the saved pages, 20 pages per page, that you've written on your blog.

Post vs Pages

1. **Page Title** – tells the reader what the page is about.
2. **Your page content** – this is information you want to share on this page
3. **Comments** – most themes support comments at the bottom of the page. Comments are disabled on pages by default and [can be enabled](#).

2. Page Content

This is an example of a page. Unlike posts, which are displayed on your blog's front page in the order they're published, pages are better suited for content that you don't expect to update frequently, like an About, Blogging Guidelines or Contact information.

Click the Edit link to change the information on this page or to create a new page.

Post vs Pages

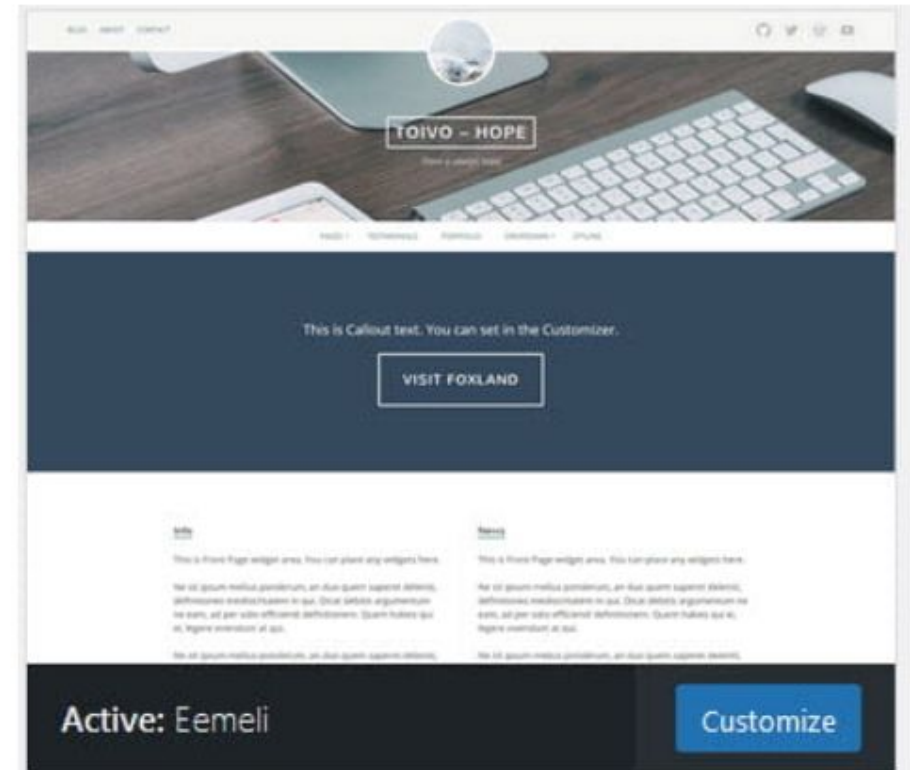
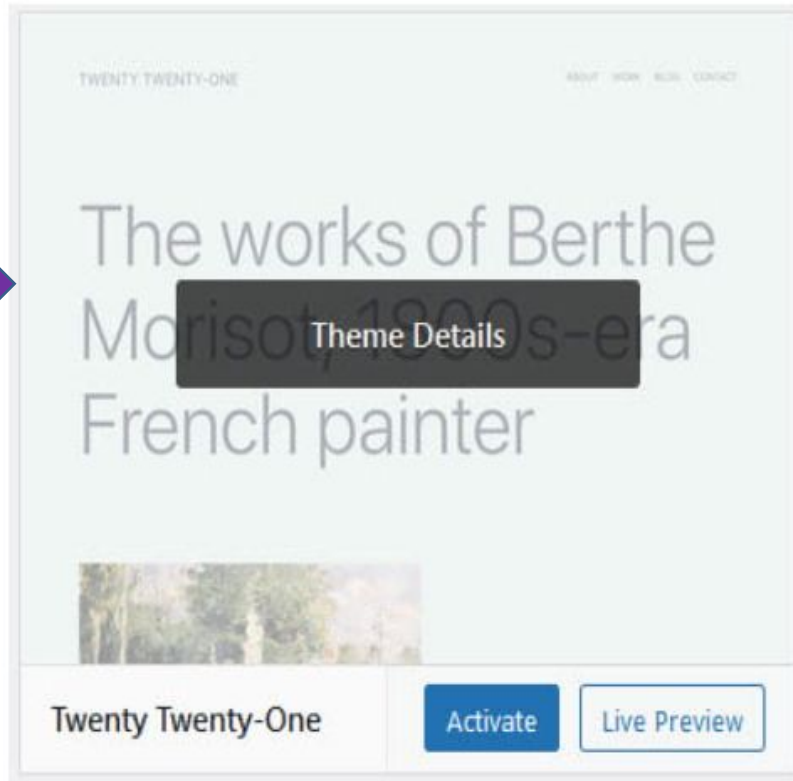
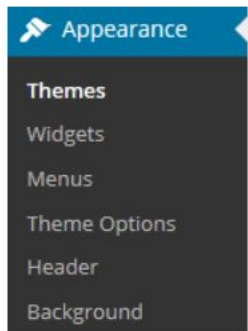
